ARTICLE XII.

SECTION 1. If any citizen of the United States shall accept, claim, receive or retain any title of nobility or honor, or shall, without the consent of Congress, accept and retain any present, pension, office or emolument of any kind whatever, from any emperor, king, prince, or foreign power, such person shall cease to be a citizen of the United States, and shall be incapable of holding any office of trust or profit under them, or either of them.

(Note.—The 10th article of the amendments to the Constitution was proposed at the second session of the third Congress; the 11th article, at the first session of the eighth Congress; and the 12th article at the second session of the eleventh Congress.)

3. But no person constitutionally ineligible to the office of ^{President} President, shall be eligible to that of Vice President of the United States.
